UNFPA and its partners delivered humanitarian aid in the shape of SRH supplies & services to **22 million women and adolescents** in more than **50 countries** in 2022

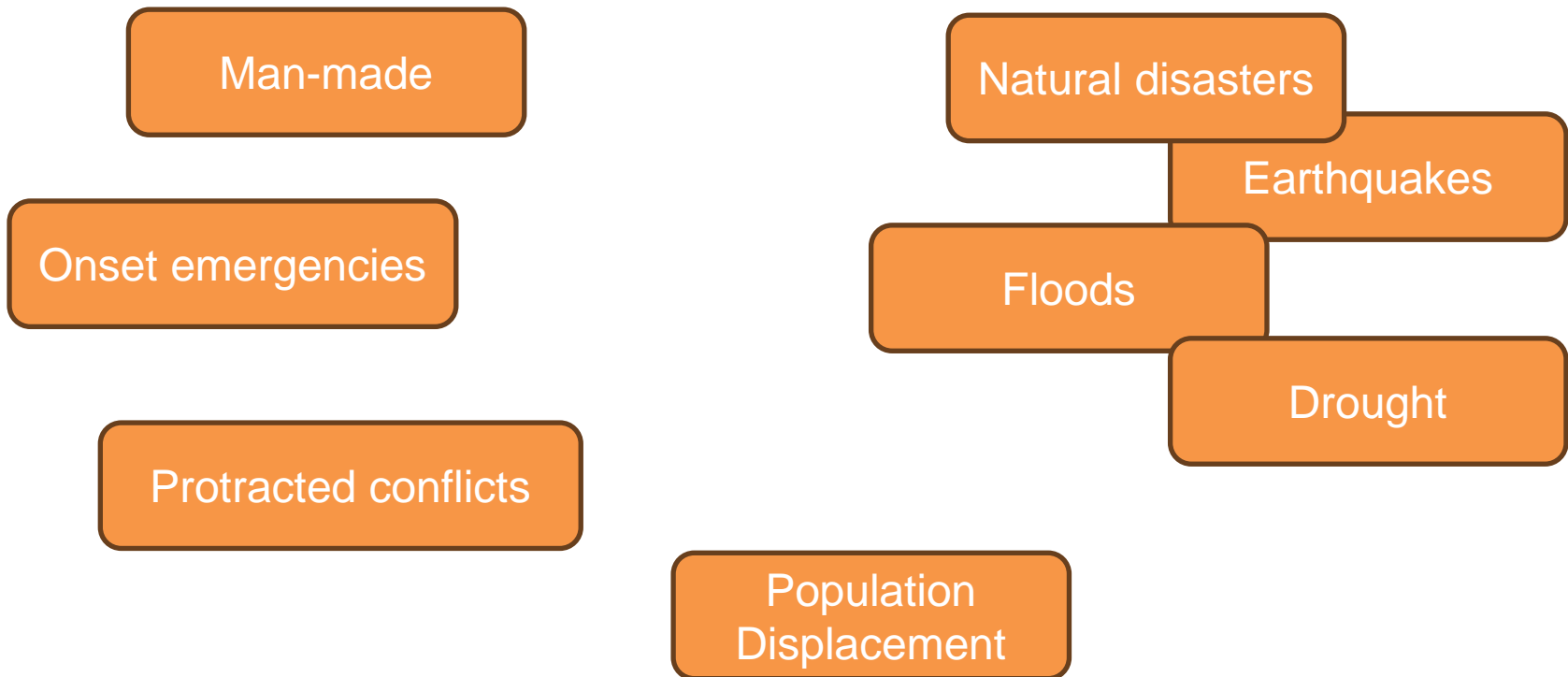

“Fast Track Procedures”

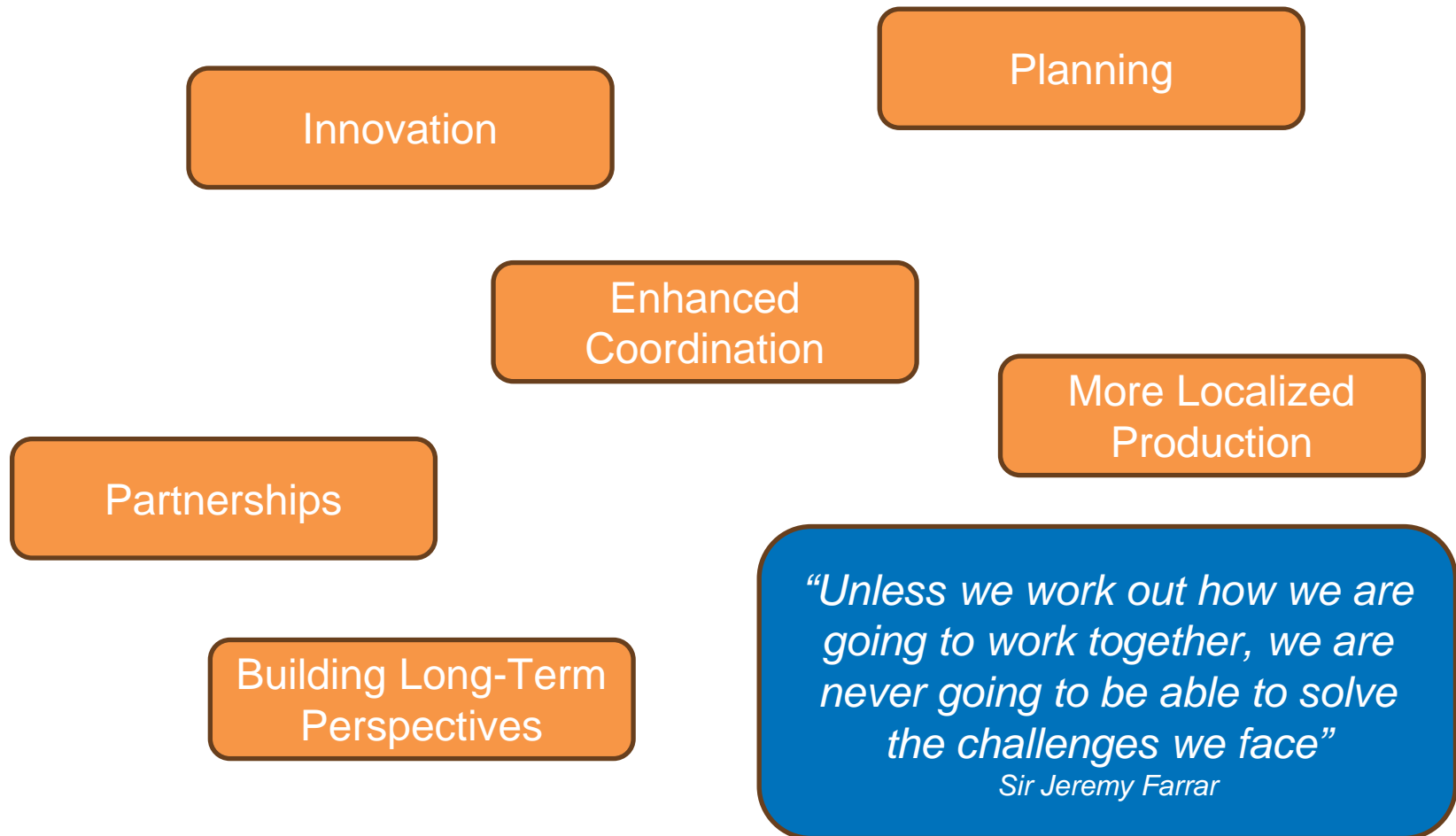
