Information for the patient

Zinc

The warnings and instructions in this leaflet are intended for the person taking the medicine. If you are a parent or carer responsible for giving the medicine to someone else such as a child, you will need to apply the instructions accordingly.

Read all of this leaflet carefully before you start taking this medicine because it contains important information for you.

- Keep this leaflet. You may need to read it again.
- If you have questions about the medicine, ask your health care provider.
- This medicine is for you only. Do not pass it on to others. It may harm them, even if their illness seems to be the same as yours.
- If you are concerned about any side effects, talk to your health care provider. This includes unwanted effects not listed in this leaflet. See section 4.

1. What [DI014 trade name] is and what it is used for

[DI014 trade name] is used for treating acute and persistent diarrhoea in infants and children aged up to 5 years.

[DI014 trade name] contains zinc. In the body, a small quantity of zinc (a so-called 'trace element') is essential for many different processes e.g. the ability to fight off infection. Zinc also prevents the growth of bacteria that can cause diarrhoea.

2. What you need to know before you take [DI014 trade name]

Do not give [DI014 trade name]

- if your child is allergic (hypersensitive) to zinc sulfate or any of the other ingredients of this medicine (listed in section 6);
- if your child has copper deficiency.

Talk to your health care provider if this applies to your child.

Warnings and precautions

Talk to your health care provider if your child suffers from kidney disease.

If this applies to your child, it is important that you tell your health care provider before giving [DI014 trade name] to your child, and they will decide what to do. It may still be safe for your child to take [DI014 trade name].

Other medicines and [DI014 trade name]

Keep a list of all the medicines the child takes, or has recently taken, including medicines obtained without a prescription, vitamins and hearbal medicines. Show this list to your health care provider or pharmacist before giving [DI014 trade name] to your child.

In particular, tell your health care provider if the child is taking:

- copper supplements
- certain medicines for treating bacterial infection including cefalexin, ceftibuten, quinolones (e.g. ciprofloxacin and levofloxacin) and tetracyclines (e.g. oxytetracycline and tetracycline)
- penicillamine, which is used to treat rheumatism and certain metabolic disorders such as Wilson's disease and cystinuria
- trientine (used in the treatment of Wilson's disease)
- calcium salt preparations
- iron preparations

It is important to take zinc at least 3 hours before or 3 hours after taking these medicines because zinc can reduce the effect of these medicines or the medicines can reduce the effect of zinc.

[DI014 trade name] with food and drink

[DI014 trade name] should be given between meals.

Pregnancy and breast-feeding

Take advice from your health care provider about taking [DI014 trade name] if you are pregnant or might be pregnant.

Zinc is present in breast milk. Ask your health care provider for advice about taking [DI014 trade name] while breast-feeding.

Driving and using machines

[DI014 trade name] is not expected to affect the ability to drive and use machines.

Other ingredients of [DI014 trade name]

[DI014 trade name] also contains 40 mg aspartame in each tablet. Aspartame is a source of phenylalanine. It may be harmful if you have phenylketonuria (PKU), a rare genetic disorder in which phenylalanine builds up because the body cannot remove it properly.

3. How to take [DI014 trade name]

Always give [DI014 trade name] to your child exactly as your doctor or healthcare provider has told you.

Ask your doctor, healthcare provider or pharmacist if you have any questions about this medicine.

How much to give

Children less than 6 months

½ tablet daily for 10 to 14 days

old:

Children 6 months to 5 years

1 tablet daily for 10 to 14 days

old:

Giving [DI014 trade name]

- It is recommended you give the doses between meals.
- Fill a teaspoon (5 mL) with either breast milk or boiled and cooled water. Place the tablet (or half tablet) in the liquid. As soon as the tablet has dispersed completely, get the child to swallow all the mixture.
- If the child vomits within 30 minutes of taking the dose, give another dose. If in doubt, talk to your health care provider.

If the child has taken too many tablets of [DI014 trade name]

If the child has accidentally taken too many tablets, talk to your doctor or health care provider at once, or go to your nearest emergency unit. The child may require medical attention. Remember to take the medicine with you, and show it to the doctor or the staff of the emergency unit. If you have run out of tablets, take the empty packaging along with you.

If you forget to give [DI014 trade name]

If you miss giving a dose, give the missed dose as soon as possible. However, do not give the missed dose if the next dose is due in less than 6 hours.

If you stop giving [DI014 trade name]

Do not stop giving the medicine unless your doctor or health care provider tells you to. Follow the instructions for giving the medicine and complete the course.

4. Possible side effects

Like all medicines, [DI014 trade name] can cause side effects, but not everybody gets them.

Very common side effects (which affect more than 1 person in every 10 who take this medicine):

• Vomiting

Common side effects (which affect up to 1 in every 10 who take this medicine):

• Regurgitation (bringing up food that has been swallowed)

In most cases vomiting or regurgitation occurs within 10 minutes of the first dose and does not occur again.

Other side effects that may occur (but it is not known how frequently they occur):

- Reduced copper levels, potentially leading to copper deficiency
- Stomach pain
- Stomach irritation
- Indigestion or heartburn (dyspepsia)
- Nausea (feeling sick)
- Irritability
- Headache
- Lethargy (lack of energy)

If the child has side effects which become serious or if you notice any side effects not listed in this leaflet, tell your doctor, health care provider or pharmacist.

Reporting of side effects

If you get a side effect, talk to your health care provider. This includes side effects not listed in this leaflet. You may also be able to report such effects directly to your national reporting system if one is available. By reporting side effects, you can help to improve the available information on this medicine.

5. How to store [DI014 trade name]

Keep this medicine out of the sight and reach of children.

Do not store above 30°C, protect from moisture and light. Store in the original package in the outer carton.

Do not use this medicine after the expiry date stated on the blister label and carton, after "EXP". The expiry date refers to the last day of that month.

Do not use this medicine if you notice description of the visible signs of deterioration that it is different from the description below.

Do not throw away any medicines in wastewater or household waste. Ask your health care provider how to throw away medicines you no longer use. These measures will help protect the environment.

6. Contents of the pack and other information

What [DI014 trade name] contains

- The active ingredient is Zinc sulfate monohydrate.
- The other ingredients of [DI014 trade name] are aspartame, maize starch, ethyl vanillin, silicon dioxide, microcrystalline cellulose, crospovidone and magnesium stearate.

What [DI014 trade name] looks like and contents of the pack

[DI014 trade name] is a white to almost white, circular, uncoated tablet, debossed with 'Zn' on one side and a score line on the other side.

[DI014 trade name] is provided in white opaque PVC/PVdC-aluminium blister. Each blister card contains 10 tablets, such 10 blister cards are packed in a mono carton.
